Daylight Derby Creek at People's Park

UC has acted in collaboration with People's Park activists in the past, such as working with the People's Park Advisory Board to fund a feasibility study for daylighting Derby Creek, which runs through the park. According to Measure L passed in 1986, we should have about 10 times the park and open space than we do in District 7. People's Park originated with the public's reaction to UC's 1960's land grab. UC used Eminent Domain to bulldoze the actually-affordable housing that was on that piece of land.

For years, we've had a goal of rematriation of the land, and daylighting the creek could be a step toward that possibility, in recognizing Berkeley's colonizing history. UC has dragged its feet in releasing the bones of indigenous ancestors to local Ohlone tribes. For over a century, UC has disrespected the descendants of those whose bones sit on UC's shelves.

This is a golden opportunity for the new chancellor to create a win for the environment by daylighting the creek (studies already done) and collaborating with the city, park activists, and local tribes to rematriate this land with ongoing maintenance support.
